Aurora Hall of Fame

The Aurora High School **Athletic** Hall of Fame was established in 1982 by the Athletic Department. The **Distinguished Alumni** division was initiated in 2001 by the Aurora Alumni Association. In 2013 all areas of the Hall of Fame were put under the auspice of the Alumni Association who added a third area of recognition, **Honored Educator and Staff**. Under the Alumni Association format, all Hall of Fame candidates are now initially nominated by A.H.S. alumni and selected by a committee chaired by members of the Alumni Association Advisory Board. Future Hall of Fame inductees will be selected in all three divisions as determined by the number and qualifications of the nominated candidates.



Aurora High School Alumni Association

The Aurora Alumni Association was established in 1994 by A.H.S. alumni from the 1970s and 80s. During their first 13 years the group developed a data base of nearly 4,000 alumni, gave scholarships, sent out newsletters and started the Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame program. After a 5 year period of inactivity from 2007 – 2012, the group reorganized under new leadership in 2012 and established a Board of Directors that includes Aurora Alumni from every decade between the 1960s – today. The current revitalized group has established a website, increased their visibility, given scholarships, and is proud to be inducting A.H.S. alumni in our Hall of Fame.

Jericka Duncan Class of 2001 Athletic Hall of Fame

Jericka was a three year letter winner in Basketball and a four year letter winner in Track and Field. She was part of seven school track and field records and a three time OHSAA State Champion in the 330m Hurdles, 4x100m Relay and the 4x200m Relay. Jericka established 5 school records which stand today including 100m High Hurdles, 330m High Hurdles, 4x100m Relay, 4x200m Relay, and 4x400m Relay. Jericka was on the CVC all 2nd place team in 1998 and was named to the CVC 1st place honors team in 1999, 2000, and 2001. As a senior she was named to the CVC 1st team.

Upon graduation Jericka attended Ohio University on academic and athletic scholarships where she majored in communications and was the 2005 recipient of the NAACP Image Award of Athletics. While there she broke the 100 meter Hurdle record which still stands today. In 2005 Jericka was named team captain and was the team's MVP in 2004 and 2005.

After college graduation Jericka began her career as a correspondent and reporter at WETM-TV in Elmira, New York. In 2007 she began reporting at the CBS affiliate WIVB-TV in Buffalo, New York. In 2010 Jericka joined CBS News at KYW-TV in Philadelphia as a news correspondent. At KTW-TV she earned a first place award from the Associated Press, a local Emmy Award in the "Best Morning Show" category, the 2007 "Best Spot News Coverage" form the New York Broadcasters Association and an Associated Press Emmy nomination for a special report on Social Security scam. In addition, the Philadelphia Association of Black Journalists named her "Journalist of the Year".

In 2013 Jericka was elevated to her current position as a CBS News Correspondent for News Services at CBS News, the networks 24 hour television newsgathering service. As a correspondent she has covered the One Year Anniversary of Hurricane Sandy, the D.C. Navy Yard shootings, and was in France to cover the 70th Anniversary of D-Day. Jericka's community involvement includes the Black Leadership Commission on HIV/AIDs, as well as a Boys and Girls club and a Big Brothers – Big Sisters mentor.

Tia Dionne Hodge-Jones is an award-winning writer, actor, playwright, screenwriter and director/producer. She earned her M.A. and B.A. in English Literature from Case Western Reserve University.

As an actress, she has appeared in numerous national and regional on-camera and voice-over/radio commercials, and has appeared on 666 Park Avenue, in a number of the Law & Order T.V. series episodes, as well as the pilot The Third Degree for Fox, to name a few. In 1998, she received a Best Actress nomination by the Independent Reviewers of New England for her performance as "Veronica" in New Repertory Theatre's production of Athol Fugard's Valley Song. She has appeared as the recurring characters "Angel Mel" and "Amelia Bennett" on ABC's One Life to Live, and can currently be seen as a panelist on Cafemom.com's Coffee Shop Confessions. Tia Dionne began her career behind the camera as Assistant Director to award-winning director/writer/playwright, Dave Cockley. Tia Dionne went on to write, produce and direct two short films for the inaugural NYC Midnight Movie Madness Filmmaking Competition (2002), and was awarded the First Runner-up prize for Once Upon A Once Upon.

Tia Dionne also directed and produced the pilot episode of UnCorked: A Slightly Irreverent Look at Wine for Wine Ventures which garnered her a Directors Citation from the Black Maria Film Festival. She has since directed episodes for BN4REAL.TV, and has produced/directed live events and video projects for America Scores and Veterans Across America. Her pilot, The Whiskey, was an Official Selection at the Producers Guild of Sundance America Lab at the Film Festival (2009). Tia Dionne is the inaugural recipient of the Adrienne Kennedy Society's Louis Kent-Hope Award for Excellence in Creative Writing & Poetry. She is a former National Poetry Slam Team Champion. Her Cleveland Trilogy plays—Puddin', Love... Like Lemonade and A Spider in Wine—have all received early workshops by New Jersey Dramatists & Waterfront Ensemble. Tia Dionne is a member of SAG-AFTRA, AEA the Dramatists Guild of America, New York Women in Film, and the National Association of Professional Women. She is a proud acting and filmmaking instructor at Performers Theatre Workshop in Maplewood, NJ, and resides with her husband and daughter in Bloomfield.

Andrew Kmetz grew up in Akron, Ohio. As a youth he became an accomplished tap-dancer. When he was twelve years old he spent a year in Hollywood, California working on the set of MGM studios making short movies. After High School graduation he attended Illinois Benedictine Seminary where he earned a Degree in Philosophy and spent a year in the Benedictine Monastery. In 1953 he was drafted into the U.S. Army and spent two years in the Signal Corp at Fort Bennings, Georgia.

After the military Andy returned to college at Kent State and earned a Bachelor's Degree in Speech and English. Andy's first teaching position was in the Ravenna, Ohio Schools where he taught High School Speech and English. While in Ravenna he returned to college and earned a Master's Degree in Theater Arts with a minor in Art. These new interests and degrees led to new teaching areas in Ravenna and he began teaching Middle School art and High School Drama.

Andy came to the Aurora Schools in 1968 initially as a High School English teacher. However, he was soon persuaded by Middle School principal Mike Lenzo to join the staff at Harmon Middle School as an Art teacher, a position he held until his retirement. Soon after coming to Harmon School he began a long term collaboration in drama productions with Harmon English teacher Dan Dyer. They would produce countless shows together including the popular "Farewell to Harmon" productions. In the early 1980's Andy also directed musicals at the High School and served as choreographer with the Aurora Community Theater. After his retirement in 1985 Andy taught art as a volunteer at St. Patrick School in Kent. Until recently he also served as a volunteer in the emergency room of Robinson Memorial Hospital.

Eileen Kutinsky earned her Bachelor's Degree in Science from Mount Union College and her Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling from Kent State University. She began her teaching career in a one room school house in Lexington, Ohio followed by teaching third and fourth grade at Bolton School. Later she taught kindergarten and first grade in the Streetsboro schools.

Eileen began her illustrious and memorable career at Harmon Middle school in Aurora in 1965 as a sixth grade science teacher, a position she held for many years. She also taught some eighth grade science at Harmon. Eileen's outgoing, challenging, and hands on approach endeared her as a student favorite for several generations of Harmon school students. She was a driving force in the establishment of the 6th grade annual sixth grade camp where her hands on approach to nature and scientific topics were integrated into the learning experiences. Certainly no one in the community or at Harmon school will forget the year they shared the experience of raising a cow at Harmon school. In addition to her Harmon career, Eileen has taught Science and English at the college level and served as a Student Teaching Supervisor. Ever the activist, Eileen has served on the Streetsboro Board of
